
This campaign saw over Millions of rands being raised in the name of the 2019 Special Olympics South Africa national team.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS SOUTH AFRICA HEALTHY COMMUNITIES

Special Olympics is the largest provider of free health care for people with intellectual disabilities.

The Special Olympics Healthy Athletes Screening assesses the health of individuals with an intellectual disability in 8 different medical disciplines. As special Olympics South Africa we offer 7 of the different medical disciplines to our athletes across South Africa and through this initiative we are able to reach around 1000 and more athletes every year.

Athletes are screened in the following disciplines:

- MedFest-General Practitioners (General health assessed by General Practitioners)
- 2. Healthy Hearing (Hearing problem assessed by Audiologists)
- 3. Opening Eyes (Eye tests assessed by Optometrists)
- 4. Special Smiles (Dental health assessed by Dentists)
- 5. Fun Fitness (General fitness assessed by Physiotherapist's and Biokeneticist)
- 6. Fit Feet (Feet assessed by Podiatrists)
- 7. Health Promotion (Healthy lifestyle guidance assessed by dietitians and nurses)

Special Olympics South Africa announced a ground-breaking partnership with The Skateroom and Skateistan South Africa. Where the partnership will provide children with and without intellectual disabilities the opportunity to grow in confidence, experience freedom and learn new life skills through

Special Olympics South Africa partners with The Skateroom and Skateistan South Africa for an innovating inclusive programme in support of the athletes of Special Olympics.

This skateboarding program is a first of its kind in South Africa and will empower a new generation of adaptive athletes to share a message of inclusion with the world.

We later hosted an amazing event in partnership with the Skateroom and Skateistan where, 20 Special Olympics South Africa athletes graduated from a 3-month skateboarding pilot that they have been following, which is an adapted version of Skateistan's Skate and Create program.

Our athletes graduated at a fully immersive Unified event that explored some of the cultural elements associated with the sport of skateboarding. This event included DJ Jules on the decks, rap performance by new kid on the block, Steero-God and a demonstration by 11-year-old pro skateboarder, Ashton Banwell.









The pilot event was hosted in partnership with The Skateroom and Skateistan South Africa and was funded by part of the sales of The Skateroom x Van Gogh Museum collection.

This partnership was formed with the goal of providing athletes with an intellectual disability the opportunity to try a new sport, gain more self-confidence, experience freedom, and learn new life skills. The event was attended by family members, Skateistan skateboarders, the media and Special Olympics South Africa supporters.





We hosted a sporting event in partnership with Shumbs Shaba, at the Shillelagh Farm in Diepsloot. Where our athletes participated in Soccer, Volleyball, Bocce and Equestrian.

The event started gracefully with a mini torch run, which was led by SOSA athlete Kenneth Mokabo. We also had the Special Olympics Regional Clinical Advisor, Ms Faith Chabedi who led a team of student volunteers from the University of Johannesburg in the Optometry Department, who carried out a standalone Opening Eyes screening for the athletes.

Disability Rights awareness month

Special Olympics South Africa CEO, Ms Ancilla Smith was invited by the Department of Energy and Mineral resources, to speak about the Special Olympics movement as we commemorate Disability Rights awareness month.

She also highlighting the needs of people with intellectual disabilities and how the power of sport over the years has helped with the development of the athletes of Special Olympics.


